This is also a time when management is doing more inspections of homes and yards to be sure that Breckenridge remains a desirable and highly sought after community to live.

Spring Maintenance YOUR Home & Garden

General Tips

- Remove winter holiday decorations and lights
- Solar ground lights should not be crooked
- Remove garbage and leaves from your yard as well as miscellaneous items that should not be stored outside of your home
- Be sure yard waste bags are put at the curb no earlier than the evening before pickup. Refer to the City of
- Naperville's website for more info.
- Store garbage and recycling
- containers in your garage.
- Repair leaning or damaged mailboxes. If needed, paint your mailbox, replace the red flag, replace rotted posts, etc.

Few Reminders

• Install basketball hoop stands correctly. There should not be bricks, bags, etc. holding the stand down. The base should be filled with water or sand or there are anchors for portable hoops at hoopanchor.com. Replace nets that are either missing or torn. If basketball pole or rim is rusted, consider painting or replacing.

• Please assess the exterior of your home to see if anything needs attention, e.g, a deck may need painting, home needs staining, a gutter may have fallen off your home, bricks in paver walls/around trees need to be straightened, yard needs spring cleanup, etc.

If you plan to start new exterior construction or alteration, please complete an Architectural Modification Application and submit this to our Property Manager, Stacy at stacy@mcpmc.com for approval by the Review Committee, before you begin. DO NOT begin any exterior work without written approval.

Naperville is a Safe Community... It's not a Crime-Free Community!



hether you are traveling out of town for spring break or running to the grocery store, it is important to keep your property safe. This month, the Naperville Police Department aims to make Naperville "A Safer Naper" by educating residents on burglary prevention. While Naperville is a safe community, we are not a crime free community. It takes police and citizens working in partnership to prevent crime and build safer neighborhoods.

The six members of the Naperville Police Department Crimes Against Property Crimes Unit, composed of a sergeant and five detectives, review on average over 200 property crime cases each month. Property crimes include burglaries, theft, fraud (which includes identity theft) and vandalism.

In 2023, there were 51 residential burglaries in the City of Naperville. Did you know a burglar can be in and out of a home in as little as ninety seconds?

In addition to locking doors, windows, closing garage doors and keeping exterior lights from dusk until dawn, we especially want to emphasize securing the rear of your property. Burglars like the concealment of backyards to force entry into sliding glass doors or shattering a rear window. Taking steps to reduce opportunities for concealment or easy entry (like trimming landscaping, installing a camera system, and utilizing a secondary locking system on rear doors) offer an extra layer of prevention.



One of the most important things you can do to protect your property is to know who belongs in your neighborhood and be alert in protecting not only your home, but your neighbors' as well. Safeguarding Early Buds

e are all eagerly anticipating the arrival of spring, and this February warm up is giving us a taste of what is yet to come. However, unexpected challenges can arise when flowering trees and shrubs bud out too early due to a mild late winter. Here are some proactive measures you can take if Mother Nature decides winter isn't over yet to ensure a vibrant display of blooms in spring.

APRIL FOOL'S

Early spring flowering trees and shrubs, such as forsythias and magnolias rely on a delicate balance of temperature and light cues to determine when to bloom. A mild late winter can deceive these plants into thinking spring has arrived, prompting premature budding.

Depending on the species, flower buds can be vulnerable to cold temperatures as they begin to develop. While a freeze can damage flower buds, it might not affect the entire plant. In such cases, the tree will still bloom, but the process could be delayed or result in staggered or fewer blooms than expected for the season. Some varieties, such as witchhazel, are one of the hardiest blooms that thrive through prolonged freezing temperatures.

Foliar buds are more resilient against cold damage than flowering buds and will often send out a second flush of leaves when temperatures warm up again. By the time the plant has completely leafed out, there will be very little signs of early cold damage.

WORKING WITH MOTHER NATURE

For blooms more susceptible to freeze damage, here are some steps you can take to get the most blooms this spring:

COVERING: For smaller specimens that are forming flower buds, such as hydrangeas that bloom on old wood, consider covering

them with a breathable fabric or frost blanket during cold nights. This will provide an extra layer of protection against freezes and extreme temperature fluctuations.

MULCHING: Applying a layer of mulch around the base of the tree or shrub can help regulate soil temperature and moisture, minimizing the impact of fluctuating temperatures. Mulching also provides insulation against late freezes that may damage vulnerable buds on smaller specimens.

WATERING: Proper hydration is crucial during periods of erratic weather. If the ground is not frozen, ensure the soil around your flowering trees and shrubs are thoroughly watered, especially if the temperature is expected to drop after a warm spell.

PRUNING: Avoid pruning cold damage right away as it could encourage new growth before the threat of freezing temperatures has passed and result in more damage and undue stress to the plant.

MONITORING WEATHER: Keep a close eye on weather forecasts, especially during the transitional period between late winter and early spring. Being vigilant allows you to take timely action and protect your plants from harmful freezes as they come out of dormancy.

FORCING BRANCHES INDOORS

A guaranteed way to enjoy your early spring blooms is by using a simple technique called forcing branches. By bringing twigs from flowering trees and shrubs indoors and out of dormancy early, you're rewarded with colorful leaf buds and beautiful flowers. A few of our favorite trees and shrubs to use are Forsythia, Quince, Cherry, Magnolia, Redbud, Pear, Crabapple, Pussywillow. Even some Maples produce interesting buds.

Branches force best when cut on a

warm day with temps above freezing. The later in winter you bring them inside, the faster they will bloom. Twigs cut now may open in just a few weeks. You'll need clean pruners, branches, a bucket filled with warm water, and a vase or container.

Gather and snip nonessential branches at least 12" long. Be selective, considering the shape of the plant as you cut. Fill a bucket with warm water. Place fresh stems in the bucket and wait for the buds to swell, changing the water every few days. Keep branches out of the sun and mist occasionally. Once the buds begin to swell, arrange the stems in a sturdy vase or container and enjoy!

WHAT ABOUT MY PERENNIALS AND SPRING BULBS?

You may notice some of your spring bulbs popping up as well. The good news is the foliage on many of these spring bulbs tolerate the drastic late winter early spring weather changes. Some of the more hardy spring bulb flowers include snowdrops, hyacinths, daffodils and crocus.

Tulips and lily buds are more prone to cold damage. If a hard freeze or extended cold spell is in the forecast, it would be advisable to cover them to ensure healthy blooms. If frost damage does occur, avoid cutting back damaged foliage until it has completely browned and died back to ensure blooms for next year.

Some early blooming perennials, such as hellebores, are very resilient to freezing temperatures, while others, such as bleeding hearts should be protected. Leafy perennials

such as hostas can also be affected by spring freezes and should be covered when a frost or hard freeze is eminent. Perennials planted in the last year are most susceptible of spring freeze damage so adequate mulching or timely covering is essential for these plants.

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
